THE COMPLETE LIBERTY DIALOGUES CASE FLOW

PURPOSE

This document provides a complete roadmap of a Liberty Dialogues case from beginning to end. It is designed to tie together the entire training series and demonstrate how each stage connects to the next.

STAGE 1 — CITATION OR CHARGE

Preserve documents, identify deadlines, remain calm, and begin organizing the case.

STAGE 2 — ORIENTATION

Review the Liberty Dialogues framework and understand Authority, Jurisdiction, Status, Standing, Obligation, Enforcement, and Presumption.

STAGE 3 — PREPARATION

Organize evidence, prepare questions, review procedures, and create a structured trial plan.

STAGE 4 — FIRST APPEARANCE

Establish pro per status when appropriate and begin creating the record.

STAGE 5 — VOIR DIRE

Identify bias, confirm understanding of burden of proof, and evaluate fairness.

STAGE 6 — OPENING STATEMENT

Explain what the evidence is expected to show and frame the issues for the jury.

STAGE 7 — GOVERNMENT'S CASE

Listen carefully, take notes, identify assumptions, and prepare cross examination.

STAGE 8 — CROSS EXAMINATION

Ask focused questions that reveal facts, omissions, and assumptions.

STAGE 9 — OBJECTIONS

Protect the record and require that evidence be properly presented.

STAGE 10 — CLOSING ARGUMENT

Focus on burden of proof, credibility, and what was or was not established.

STAGE 11 — VERDICT

Remain calm regardless of outcome and prepare for the next stage if necessary.

STAGE 12 — POST-TRIAL MOTIONS

Review preserved issues and file appropriate motions when warranted.

STAGE 13 — APPEAL

File the Notice of Appeal, organize the record, and prepare appellate arguments.

STAGE 14 — EXTRAORDINARY RELIEF

Consider writs, habeas relief, or other extraordinary remedies when appropriate.

THE LIBERTY DIALOGUES THREAD

At every stage ask: • What authority is being exercised? • What jurisdiction is being asserted? • What status is being applied? • Who has standing? • What obligation is claimed? • What facts support enforcement? • What assumptions remain unproven?

FINAL PRINCIPLE

The Liberty Dialogues does not replace preparation. It organizes preparation. This roadmap demonstrates how structure can be applied from the first citation to the final appeal.
